Important quotes include Macbeth's reflection, 'To be thus is nothing; but to be safely thus,' and his soliloquy, 'O, full of scorpions is my mind,' which reveal his growing anxiety and moral deterioration. How do the events of Act 3 set the stage for the subsequent acts? Act 3 introduces Macbeth's increasing paranoia, the consequences of his violent actions, and the unraveling of his sanity. These developments lead to further chaos and set the tone for the final acts' tragic downfall.

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
